The New Brunswick accounts are, however, well kept, and there will be little difficulty in putting them into the desired shape, so as to shew in all cases the gross receipts and expenditures, as has been done for several years in Canada.

We thus have as the ordinary revenue and expenditure of the Provinces now comprising the Dominion, the year before their union, the following amounts :--

This is a considerable improvement over the figures of the preceding year, 1865, when the ordi-nary revenue and expenditure of the same Provinces was, according to the Year Book :- Revenue \$13,023,169; Expenditure \$14,175,071; deficit \$1,151,902. The increased expenditure for 1866 was principally on militia account, in consequence of Fenian raids. The increased revenue was chiefly from Customs, accounted for by the more general prosperity of the country.

(a) The amount given in the Auditor's account, is \$1,373,256, which includes \$13,364 "Surplus Civil List" which we omit, and omita the expenditure on railway accounts taken out of the receipts before being handed in to him \$36,570, which we include. It also excludes \$76,510, which appears as the receipts of the Post Office, and which we add to the net expenditure given in the statement of accounts
