## NEW BRUNSWICK.

There is but one Lunatic Asylum in this Province; it was established in 1848. The Asylum is a handsome brick building covered with cement, well planned and well built: it stands on an elevated, healthful and beautiful situation on the St. John's river, commanding extensive views on every si'e. It is about a mile distant from the City of St, John's, on the opposite side of the river. There are about 75 acres of land attached to the Asylum. The subjoined tabular statements taken from the report for 1867, of the Superintendent of the institution, gives the movements of patients from its opening to 1867

## NOVA SCOTIA.

There is but one Lunatic Asylum in Nova Scotia. It is called "The Provincial Hospital for the Insane," The Hospital was established in 1859. The building is a large brick building; the plun and internal arrangements are excellent. The situation\* of the Asylum at Dartmouth, on the Haifax harbor, opposite to the City of Ha'ifax, is clevate I and al'y, commanding extensive and beautiful land and sea views. There are about 85 acres of land attached to the institution. In 1867 an Assistant Medical Officer was appointed on the application of the Medical Superintendent. The subjoined tables are taken from the Annual Report of the Me lical Superintendent for the year 1867:—
