It appears from the Report of the Minister of Agriculture that the number of Patents issued during 1871 was 512, against 556 during issued during 1811 was olz, against see during 1870, thus showing a slight decrease. In the number of applications for Patents there was also a decrease, the numbers being 579 against 626 in the corresponding year. pies of the book, mar, chart, musical composition, photograph, print, cut or engraving, and in the case of paintings, drawings, statuary or sculptures, a written description of such as are intended to be copyrighted. one copy of all the works so deposited, is placed in the hands of the Librarian o Parliament, and the other is kept of record in the Department. The accumulation of these works is becoming considerale, and it already forms a valuable record of Canadian literature, science and art."
