Imports and Exports of the Dominion.

Perhaps the most remarkable of the features of the Dominion, is the immense increase of its trade since Confederation. This increase is altogether greater than the most sanguine anticipated, before that event took place. In 1866-67 the total trade amounted to \$94,791,860; in 1871-721t reached \$194,070,190; showing that the value of trade had more than doubled within the period.

For the purpose of comparison we repeat the figures showing the total trade for the
