in future, when disposed of, be sold by auction. Mr. Cartwright brought in a bill changing close of fiscal year to 31st March. Mr. Holton thought the change might be useful and perhaps called for but a great deal of inconvenience would flow from it, one of which was that the estimates would have to be voled a year ahead every session; he thought so important a Bill should have been introduced earlier in the session. Dr. Tupper approved of the reasons for the change to a large extent. and thought it would involve an earlier meeting of Parliament which would be an advantage. In committee an amendment was added, providing for compara-tive statements, and the Bill as anend-ed passed. Debate on Pacific Railway was resumed by Mr. Dymond, who said it was resumed by Mr. Dymond, who said it was a matter of absolute necessity it should be constructed. He thought Canada had little conception generally of the uitimate value of B. Columbia; Canada would have to bear a heavy burden for a considerable length of time, but both as a matter of in-terest and of national good faith, the work must be accomplished, and the shameful word "repudiation" never utter-ed. Mr. White, Mr Langevin and Mr. Hag-sart followed in support of the motion gart followed in support of the motion, the last named saying, that from evidence taken before the Immigration Committee there was good arable laad in the North West to maintain a population of forty millions, independent of Manitoba. After a prolonged debate the motion was nega-tived by a vote of 104 to 59. The supple-mentary estimates were presented by Mr. Oartwright, and the House adjourned.
