During the past year 75 new offices were opened, and Increase the total number of offices is now considerably more than of letters double the number at Confederation, there having been an increase of 4,275. As compared with 1889, there was a decrease of 369,000 in the number of registered letters and of 2,000 in that of free letters, but an increase of 1,432,000 in the total number of letters sent. The decrease in the number of registered letters was no doubt due to the increase of the registration fee from 2 cents to 5 cents, but the increase in the total number of letters was by no means so large as usual. As the total number is derived from an average struck four times a year, it may be that some special circumstances combined to reduce the correspondence during one or more of the enumer-
