358. In Quebec, the grain crop, taken as a whole, was above the Crops in average, the only grains that were weak having been barley 1890. and oats, the latter being decidedly below middling. Potatoes were said to be good, but rot was prevalent in many localities. The hay crop was good and roots were also good and plentiful.

359. In Nova Scotia wheat was an 88 per cent. crop and barley Crops in Nova Scoand oats 87 and 75 per cent. respectively; hay, $97\frac{1}{2}$; potatoes, tia, 1890. 91 and turnips 95 per cent. The oat crop is the principal and permanent crop of this Province. The apple crop was short, reaching only about 73 per cent. of a full crop.

360. Of crops in New Brunswick in 1890, the Secretary for Crops in Agriculture said in November: "We are approaching the Brunswick end of what has been in some respects the most untavourable season for agriculture experienced in this Province in recent years." Wheat is always a sure crop in this Province, but the absence of milling facilities prevents it being cultivated to any great extent. This grain was 92 per cent. of a full crop; oats, 66; barley, 80; potatoes, 77; turnips, 80, and apples 73 per cent. In the two last mentioned Provinces percentages only and no actual figures of quantity are collected.

361. No particulars are available concerning the crops of the Crops elseremainder of the Dominion.

363. The wheat crop of 1889 was a light one, aggregating, wheat as nearly as can be ascertained, about 30,871,656 bushels. To crop in Canada,
