The control of educational matters in Manitoba was formerly Education in the hands of a Board of Education, divided into two sections, one in Mani-Protestant and one Roman Catholic; but by the Act of 1890 this toba. arrangement, together with the separate school system, was abolished. and a Department of Education established, consisting of the Executive Council and an advisory board composed of seven members, four appointed by the Department of Education, two by the public and high school teachers, and one by the council of the University of Manitoba. The validity of the above Act has been called in question and the matter is now before the courts. In the meantime, however, the Act is now in operation.

608. Two sections of land, 640 acres each, in every township, are re-School served and held in trust by the Dominion Government as school lands lands. for the purpose of aiding and promoting education, and it is estimated that upwards of 1,500,000 acres are available for settlement. These lands have, until quite recently, been purposely kept out of the market.
