There were four Art schools in operation in 1902. In connection with and under the control of the Department of Education were 306 public libraries, with 535,528 books, and about 40,875 members. Their property was valued at \$426,104, with liabilities of \$28,458. Besides these there were 140 free libraries, with upwards of 604,864 volumes and 131,917 readers, with assets amounting to \$725,773 and liabilities \$116,469.

The second Friday in May in each year has been set apart under the name of Arbor Day, for the purpose of planting trees and improving the school grounds. In 1902, 10,333 trees were planted and 14,270 plants set out.
