LOUISIANA PURCHASE EXHIBITION HELD AT ST. LOUIS. U.S.A.

Date of opening—April 30, 1904. closing—December 1, 1904.

The Canadian pavilion was situated in a very prominent position.

The mineral uxhibit made by Canada was the largest and most representative collection of economic minerals in the Mines building.

The exhibit was awarded 2 grand prizes, 27 gold, 27 silver and 14 bronze

medals.

The agricultural exhibit was full and was awarded 2 $\,$ grand prizes and 4 $\,$ gold medals.

The forestry exhibit contained specimens of many varieties of Canadian

woods, also fur-bearing animals, &c.

The fruit exhibition comprised 90 varieties of apples, and 400 varieties of garden fruits.

Canada was represented by Wm. Hutchison, Exhibition Commissioner for Canada and W. A. Burns, secretary.

Cost of exhibition was over \$300,000.

CENSUS.

The Census of 1901, taken according to the *de jure* system, gives the following results.
