

judges during the first three years of service and thereafter in Prince Edward Island, \$3,000; in Prince Edward Island, \$3,500 for the judge of the county court of Queens county, and \$2,500 for each of two other county court judges during the first three years of service and thereafter \$3,000; in the province of Manitoba, \$2,500 each to six county court judges during the first three years of service and thereafter \$3,000; in British Columbia, the judges of the county courts of Cariboo, Westminster, Yale, Nanaimo, Vancouver, Victoria and Atlin, the judge and junior judge of the county court of Kootenay, and the judge of the county court of East Kootenay, each \$3,000. But it was provided in the case of all county court judges that the increases of salary should take effect only after the act came into force.

Travelling allowances.

In the case of all judges there is paid the sum of six dollars per day in addition to moving or transportation expenses for each day during which they are attending in court or in chambers at any other place than that at which they are obliged to reside, providing, however, that in the case of any district or county court judge the amount shall not exceed \$200 in any one year.

Judges required to devote themselves to judicial duties.

Besides making provision for the foregoing allowances, the act provides that no judge mentioned shall, either directly or indirectly, as director or manager of any corporation, company or firm, or in any other manner whatever, for himself or others, engage in any occupation or business other than his judicial duties, but shall devote himself exclusively to such duties.

Salaries of supreme court judges.

By chapter 47 the salary of the chief justice of the supreme court of Canada is made \$10,000 a year, and of each of the puisné judges \$9,000, and of the judge of the exchequer court \$8,000; and the judges of these courts are in the same way as all other judges prohibited from engaging in any other occupation, and required to devote themselves exclusively to their judicial duties.

Allowances to members of Parliament.

By chapter 43 an allowance is made to each member of the Senate and House of Commons of \$20 for each day's attendance if the session does not extend beyond thirty days, and if the session extends beyond that time the allowance is made \$2,500. For every day on which a member does not attend a sitting of the House of which he is a member a deduction at the rate of \$15 per day is required to be made.
