Canada's trade.

The value of dutiable and free goods entered for consumption last year was \$262,373,570, and the value of domestic goods exported was \$210,806,459, being an increase in five years of \$89,472,912, or 51:75 per cent on imports and \$43,046,237 or 25.66 per cent on exports. Coin and bullion and foreign products comprise the rest of the trade of the Dominion. increase of dutiable goods in the five years was 53.75 per cent. and of free goods 48.71 per cent. The increase of animal products exported in the five years was 21.61 per cent, of agricultural products 61 per cent, and of manufactured products 46.68 per cent. The increase in the amount of duty collected on imports in the five years, without any change in the rates of duty, was 52 per cent.

A new industry in Canada is the manufacture of beet sugar. Two factories were erected in Ontario in 1902, one at Wallace. The sugar burg in Kent county, and one at Berlin in Waterloo county. beet industry. In 1903 a third factory was built at Raymond in Alberta.
