Consumption of Animal Products.—The consumption of meats in Canada in 1929 is estimated at 667,461,257 pounds of beef, 798,639,058 pounds of pork and 68,848,278 pounds of mutton and lamb. The per capita consumption of beef on this basis amounts to 68·13 pounds; pork, 81·52 pounds, and mutton and lamb, 7·03 pounds, a total of 156·68 pounds of meats per capita per annum. The corresponding data for other animal products are as follows:—butter, 293,484,036 pounds and 29·95 pounds; cheese, 34,782,012 pounds and 3·55 pounds; eggs, 299,-256,707 dozen and 30·55 dozen; and poultry 108,673,236 pounds and 11·09 pounds. Details are given in Table 17.
