Section 3.—Municipal Public Finance.1

The existence of local self-governing units has always been characteristic of democratic societies, and nowhere more so than in Canada. The struggle for responsible government was naturally accompanied by an agitation for local selfgovernment in the cities and towns of Canada, and after responsible government had been conceded, a complete system of municipalities was established throughout the old Province of Canada by the Municipal Act of 1849.2 Under the division of powers made by the British North America Act between the Dominion
