Vocational and Technical Education.—The introduction of technical and vocational courses in the high school curricula has received strong stimuli in recent years from the Technical Education Acts of 1919, 1929 and 1931, under the terms of which the Dominion Government undertook to provide subsidies to the provinces to encourage the growth of technical instruction. From the outset evening classes during the winter months have been an important part of the work of the technical schools. The number of students in institutions for technical education coming within the scope of the Technical Education Act of 1919 (9-10 Geo. V, c. 73) in the academic years ended June 30, was as follows: 1921, 56,774; 1922, 61,961; 1923, 70,300; 1924, 79,829; 1925, 88,024; 1926, 88,961; 1927, 93,682; 1928, 109,008; 1929, 121,252; 1930, 130,847; 1931, 134,763; (Table 7).
