Expenditure and Revenue.—Table 6 shows the expenditure and revenue of the Public Works Department of the Dominion Government, for the fiscal years 1926-1931. For the fiscal year 1931 the expenditure was \$33,371,613, as compared with \$25,607,523 in 1930—an increase of \$7,764,090, largely accounted for by expenditures for harbours and rivers, dredging and public buildings.
