Subsection 5.—The Manufactures of British Columbia,* 1933.

British Columbia was, in 1933, the third most important manufacturing province in the Dominion, producing goods with a gross value of \$145,490,955. About 15 p.c. of this production, or \$21,592,153, is seen in Table 15 to be that of the sawmilling industry; the predominance of forest products industries in the industrial life of the province is still further emphasized if to this figure be added \$11,098,400, the value of production of the pulp and paper industry, which ranks second. Third in importance among the industries of the province is that of fish curing and packing, with a gross value of production of \$10,685,749. This was followed by central electric stations with \$9,892,781, petroleum products \$7,638,951, slaughtering and meat packing \$5,781,020, etc.
