¹For statistics of the wages and hours of employees of steam railways and wages of employees in and about coal mines in Canada, see pp. 751-752 of the 1930 Year Book, where the rates, etc., for the past seven or eight years to 1929, are given. Wages in coal mines of Nova Scotia were reduced 10 p.c. in 1932, and in Drumheller, Alta., in 1933; in 1935 in both districts 5 p.c. was restored. On steam railways deductions of 10 p.c. were in effect during 1932, 1933 and 1935; 15 p.c. in 1934; running trades 20 p.c. for six months in 1933. Section 2.—Wages and Hours of Labour under Provincial Minimum Wage Legislation.

Seven of the provinces of Canada have in effect legislation providing for minimum wages for female employees in certain industries and occupations through boards or commissions which establish and enforce the minimum rates, and there
