Size of Establishment in Leading Industries.—Table 32 summarizes the degree of concentration in some of the leading industries of Canada. This concentration is analysed in detail for each of these twenty-five industries at pp. 61 to 64 of the Summary Report of the Manufacturing Industries of Canada, 1941, obtainable from the Dominion Statistician, price 50 cents. Concentration is extremely marked as regards automobiles, railway rolling-stock, aircraft, cotton yarn and cloth, shipbuilding and repairs, miscellaneous chemical products, nonferrous metal smelting and refining, and pulp and paper; whereas in the case of bread and other bakery products, women's factory clothing, butter and cheese, and sawmills, the degree of concentration is low.
