Leading Branches of Production in Each Province.—Maritime Provinces.— It is readily apparent that farming is the predominant source of income in Prince Edward Island, accounting for nearly 61 p.c. of the net value of production for that Province in 1947. The increases in value of construction and manufactures over 1946 were not large enough to offset the relatively sharp drop in fisheries which fell to \$2,610,000 from \$4,156,000 resulting in a decline in the total net value. Despite decreases in agriculture, fisheries, trapping and mining, the recorded gains in forestry, construction and manufactures advanced the total value of production in Nova Scotia to a new high in 1947. Similarly, sharp advances in forestry, construction and manufactures advanced in relative importance over 1946 in the three Maritime Provinces.

Quebec.—The production of manufactures, excluding the duplication of processing industries, amounted to almost 52 p.c. of the provincial total in 1947; agriculture produced 11 p.c. indicating the marked disparity between the two industries. Forestry is now second in relative importance accounting for more than 17 p.c. of the total. Agriculture, fisheries and trapping recorded declines in 1947 from the preceding year but these were more than offset by important gains in the other industries.

Ontario.—The outstanding position of this Province in the field of manufacturing is readily evident. The share of manufactures, excluding processing industries, was almost 61 p.c. of the total in 1947. All industries recorded advances over 1946 except
