Mortality rates for males are higher at all ages than for females, particularly in infancy. Infant mortality in 1940-42 was 62 per 1,000 live births for males compared to 49 per 1,000 for females. Because infant mortality is still so high, the expectation of life at birth is less for both sexes than at age 1. In 1947 males who had survived their first year had an expectation of life of almost 68 years and females of almost 71 years. The expectation of life of a boy at age 15 was 55 years, and of a girl 58 years. At age 25, it was about 46 years for men and almost 49 for women. At age 70, when people become eligible for old age pensions, it was  $10\cdot4$  years for men and  $11\cdot4$  years for women.

Table 8 summarizes the life expectancy figures for 1931, 1941 and 1947. During this period, life expectancy at birth has increased from 60 to over 65 years for males and from 62 to 69 years for females. The greatest increases have been among the
