## Section 2.—Live-Stock Marketings\*

The volume of commercial marketing (primary movement to stockyards and packing plants) of cattle during 1949 was the third largest on record, exceeded only in 1945 and 1948. Quality, however, was reduced. While 53 p.c. of the steers marketed during 1948 came within the choice and good grades, the proportion was reduced to 46 p.c. in 1949. Similarly heifers of choice and good grades accounted for 36 p.c. of the total in 1948 and 30 p.c. in 1949. The number of hog carcasses graded decreased by 7 p.c. from the 1948 total and  $31 \cdot 1$  p.c. were Grade A as compared with  $31 \cdot 8$  p.c. in 1948. The proportion of Grade B carcasses increased to 53 p.c. from  $52 \cdot 5$  p.c. in 1948. The volume of sheep and lambs graded alive decreased 13 p.c. while carcass grading increased slightly.
