The greater number of delinquents in 1950 was due partly to an increase in those committing thefts of various kinds (including thefts of money, articles, mail and automobiles), receiving stolen goods, and taking a motor-vehicle without the owner's consent. Thefts accounted for the delinquencies of 37·7 p.c. of the boys in 1950, robbery, burglary and breaking and entering for 22·7 p.c., and wilful damaging of property for 11·2 p.c.

Only $2 \cdot 4$ p.c. of the juveniles were judged to be delinquent for offences against the person and over a third of those convictions were for common assault.

The largest percentage of girls (40.7 p.c.) were judged incorrigible; theft was the weakness of 18 p.c., and immorality of 8.8 p.c.

The number of thefts and the cases of wilful damage to property have tended to decrease since 1930. On the other hand, the serious offences of burglary, and breaking and entering have increased in the same period.
