Main Characteristics of the Civilian Labour Force, 1946-57.—Since the end of World War II, the civilian population 14 years of age or over (exclusive of persons in institutions and Indians on reserves) has increased by over one-quarter—to an estimated 10,968,000 persons at the beginning of June 1957 from an estimated 8,768,000 persons at the same time of year in 1946. In the same period, the labour force increased by 21 pc. from 4,862,000 to 5,881,000. The labour force constituted 53.6 p.c. of the population 14 years of age or over in 1957 compared with 55.5 p.c. in 1946. The lower percentage in 1957 is largely accounted for by the fact that the population includes a greater proportion of persons over 65 years of age whose rate of participation in the labour force is much lower than that of the adult population as a whole, and by the fact that young persons are entering the labour force at a higher average age. These factors more than offset the increased proportion of married women with jobs outside the home.

The number of persons with jobs increased by 20 p.c. from 4,738,000 to 5,687,000 over the eleven years. While there has been a continuing decrease in the numbers employed in agriculture, which showed a drop of 39 p.c. in the period, total employment in non-agricultural industries increased 42 p.c. from 3,467,000 at June 1, 1946, to 4,914,000 in 1957. The increase in paid workers in non-agricultural industries was still higher and amounted to 46 p.c. The number of persons without jobs and seeking work fluctuated over the period; at the beginning of June 1957, the proportion of the labour force in this category was 3.3 p.c. and at June 1, 1946, it was 2.6 p.c.

Persons not in the labour force increased by 30 p.c. in the eleven years from 3,906,000 to 5,087,000. The increases were most marked for students and retired persons and were relatively smaller for persons keeping house in their own homes.
