Subsection 4.-Dwelling and Family Estimates

Annually since 1953 a sample survey on dwellings and household facilities and equipment has been conducted in conjunction with the monthly labour force survey. More than 35,000 households chosen by random sampling methods in about 160 different areas are interviewed. Results of the 1960 survey are presented in Table 20.

Estimates of the number of families in Canada and the provinces are also prepared annually. The estimates for 1959 were based on family data secured from the May 1959 sample survey of the labour force and population estimates for 1959.

The estimated number of families in Canada in June 1959 was 4,038,000, an increase of 332,000 or 9.0 p.c. since the 1956 Census. The average number of persons per family was 3.9 compared with 3.8 in 1956 and 3.7 in 1951. The number of children in families increased by 930,000 in the years between June 1956 and June 1959 and showed an average annual increase of 243,000 since June 1951. It is interesting to note that since 1951 there has been an increase in the percentage of families having three children or more at home and a decrease in the percentage of families having fewer than three children, or no children.
