

In 1959, 11.5 p.c. of the delinquent boys and 15.9 p.c. of the delinquent girls were not attending school. At the time of leaving school their ages ranged from 9 to 15 years, the majority being 14 to 15 years. Of the delinquent boys who had left school, 33.9 p.c. were unemployed. The largest group of wage earners (91) were in occupations concerned with transportation, such as messengers, helpers on milk delivery routes, truck drivers' assistants, etc. More than half of the girls were idle after leaving school. Factory work and domestic and personal services were the main occupations of those employed.
