During the 1956-57 academic year, plans were announced by the Federal Government for the distribution of \$50,000,000 to Canadian universities and colleges for new construction and capital equipment projects. The grants are made in an amount not exceeding 50 p.c. of the cost of specific building or capital equipment projects, with appropriate regard to the population of each province. The University Capital Grants Fund is administered by the Canada Council, which came into existence on Mar. 28, 1957. Up to Mar. 31, 1960, 41 institutions had been awarded a total of \$22,202,073 in capital grants, of which they had received \$11,793,545. The Council was also endowed with an additional \$50,000,000 for the provision of scholarships and other assistance in the fields of the arts, humanities and social sciences. (See pp. 366-368.)

PART II.—CULTURAL ACTIVITIES RELATED TO EDUCATION Section 1.—Art and Education*

Fine Art Schools, Galleries and Organizations.—Fine art appears as an elective subject of the faculty of arts in a number of universities, where it may be taken as one of five, six or more subjects for a year or two. In Mount Allison University, N.B., and in the Universities of Saskatchewan and Manitoba, there is a sufficient number of courses to allow the taking of a Bachelor degree with specialization in fine art. At the University of Toronto an Honour B.A. in art history and archaeology is offered, as well as graduate

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
