Zinc.—The estimated production of zinc (including refined zinc, zinc ores and concentrates) in 1960 showed considerable improvement over the low point of 1959, although it was still well below output for the years 1955-58. British Columbia accounts for half the Canadian production—50.1 p.c. in 1960. Quebec was second in that year with 12.2 p.c., followed in order by Saskatchewan, Ontario, Newfoundland, Manitoba and the Yukon Territory. However, the major contribution to the increased production in 1960 was made by Manitoba.

Lead.—Lead production in 1960 in the form of refined pig and recoverable lead in ore and concentrates was moderately higher than in 1959. Of the total production, British Columbia accounted for 151,886 tons, or 80.2 p.c. The only lead refinery in Canada is located in that province at Trail. Silver-lead ores are mined at Keno Hill in Yukon Territory and lead also occurs in the complex ores at Buchans in Newfoundland. Small amounts of lead concentrates are produced in Quebec and Ontario.

Silver.—Silver production in 1960 reached the record amount of 32,328,143 oz.t. with a peak value of \$28,726,788. Most of the increase over 1959 came from British Columbia although production was higher also in Quebec, Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. Production of this metal is fairly widespread across Canada, being recovered mainly as a by-product in the treatment of gold ores and ores of copper, lead, zinc, cobalt and nickel. A large part of Ontario's production of 9,737,480 oz.t. in 1960 originated in the silver-cobalt ores mined at Cobalt, and British Columbia produced 8,705,593 oz.t. from its silver-lead-zinc ores. Yukon Territory is the third largest producer, followed by Quebec. Canada's annual output of silver is exceeded only by that of Mexico and the United States.
