Employees and Salaries and Wages.—The numbers of civil air personnel licensed in recent years are shown in Table 4, p. 842. However, the figures in Table 9 include pilots and engineers in the employ of the Federal Government and of private individuals as well as those not employed at all in the ordinary sense.

## PART VI.—OIL AND GAS PIPELINES

A special article covering the history and development of pipeline construction in Canada appears in the 1954 Year Book at pp. 861-869. Additional information has been carried in each succeeding edition and the following Section brings pipeline development up to the end of 1960.

## Section 1.—Pipeline Developments\*

Oil Pipelines.—The rapid development of Canadian oil fields in the past dozen years has necessitated a corresponding growth of crude oil pipeline systems to gather the oil and transport it to market areas. Although there were small-diameter oil pipelines in Ontario in 1875 and in Alberta by 1925, almost the entire present pipeline system has been constructed since the discovery of oil at Leduc, Alta., in 1947.
