Receipts of natural gas were mainly from domestic sources—only 1.8 p.c. was imported. Imports were down to 5,476,580 Mcf. from the 1959 total of 11,634,172 Mcf., while gas received from gathering systems increased to 295,859,139 Mcf. from 210,967,454 Mcf.

Operating revenues increased 41.9 p.c. to \$98,083,659 in 1960 from \$69,124,365 in 1959.
