The density of telephones in the different provinces is influenced by the urbanization of the population and the number of telephones used for business purposes.

The major telephone systems record completed calls on representative days throughout the year and on this basis estimate the number of local conversations which, added to the actual count of long-distance calls, gives their total volume of business. Estimates are included for the smaller systems. The number of completed calls on all systems in 1959 was estimated at 9,250,220,035, or an average of 1,701 calls per telephone and 530 calls per person. Despite the increase in extended area service which eliminates toll charges between adjacent communities, long-distance calls continue to increase in number.
