Visitors from the United Kingdom accounted for close to 56 p.c. of the direct entries, about 2 p.c. less than in 1958, and the proportion originating in other Commonwealth countries fell slightly to just over 10 p.c. Residents of other European countries made up 29 p.c. of the direct arrivals, or 3 p.c. more than in the previous year, and about 5 p.c. originated in areas not already specified.

Canadians returning direct from visits to overseas countries in 1959 advanced by 24,700 in comparison with the number returning during 1958. Expenditures also reached a new high at \$123,000,000, an increase of \$20,000,000 over 1958. It was estimated that \$54,000,000 was spent on travel in the United Kingdom, \$49,000,000 in other European areas, \$9,000,000 in countries designated as "other British" and the remainder in countries not already specified. As in 1958, transportation costs to and from North America accounted for 47 p.c. of the 1959 expenditures by Canadians returning direct from overseas countries, but the proportion received by Canadian carriers, both air and vessel, was slightly lower at 39 p.c. Airlines received approximately 67 p.c. of overseas transportation charges, an increase of 6 p.c. over 1958. All major Canadian airports recorded increased traffic as 106,600 residents returned by aircraft, a gain of 28 p.c. over the 1958 total. Some 46,700 travellers returned direct by vessel, an increase of 2 p.c. over 1958.
