Financial Support.—Table 7 shows the sources of income of boards operating publicly controlled elementary and secondary schools for the years 1957-59. Their inco me is derived almost entirely from local taxation and provincial grants. Newfoundland is exceptional in that fees and income from other sources account for nearly 13 p.c. of the total income. Prior to 1961, fees were charged by Quebec school boards but school corporations are now required to provide elementary and secondary education free of
