## Section 5.—Trade by Section and Stage of Fabrication

This Section contains a series of statistics covering trade by stage of fabrication, based on the new commodity classification (see p. 968). The Section totals given in Tables 11 and 12 for the period from 1946 were compiled by converting statistics tabulated on the old classification to the new framework; old classes or fragments of classes were converted to appropriate new classes and changes in content, descriptions or codes of former classes were taken into account as much as possible, but the results for 1957 and previous years are subject to some limitations.
