

Supply and Services Jean-Pierre Goyer announced that Canadair Ltd. of Montreal would receive \$100 million in contracts from Lockheed Corp. of California to construct components for Aurora and P-3C aircraft. *Dec. 12*, Death of Frank Boucher, 76, member of the National Hockey League's Hall of Fame and seven-time winner of the Lady Byng Trophy, in Kemptonville, Ont. *Dec. 13*, The Consumer Price Index rose by 0.7% in November after a 1.0% rise in October, lifting the 12-month inflation rate to 9.1%, the highest since February 1976. *Dec. 16*, Iona Campagnola, federal minister of state for fitness and amateur sport, named Thunder Bay, Ont., as the site of the 1981 Canada Summer Games. *Dec. 18*, Two Nova Scotia companies and one from Quebec announced shared contracts up to \$125 million for Canada's participation in an international railway-building

project in Venezuela. *Dec. 19*, External Affairs Minister Don Jamieson announced that the European Economic Community had agreed to all the aspects of the 1974 Canadian policy on nuclear safeguards and that uranium shipments to the EEC could be resumed. Mr. Jamieson also said Canada would end government support for commercial relations with South Africa to underline its opposition to South African racial policies. *Dec. 21*, The Quebec National Assembly approved the Quebec government-operated no-fault car insurance plan which would insure against bodily injuries while leaving insurance for property damage to the private sector. *Dec. 22*, Defence Minister Danson announced Cabinet approval of \$63 million for design and cost details for the first of six new frigates in a \$1.5 billion program to bolster Canada's navy and shipbuilding industry.
