

833,796, or 45.42 p.c. of the total increase, and with the French and German account for 1,322,134, or 72 p.c. of the total increase in the decade. Persons of British origin constituted 54.07 p.c. of the total population in 1911 as against 57.03 p.c. in 1901. The proportion of the English to the total population increased from 23.47 to 25.30 p.c. in the ten years, whilst the Irish fell from 18.40 to 14.58 and the Scotch from 14.90 to 13.85 p.c. The proportion of German origin was 5.46 p.c. in 1911, as against 5.78 p.c. in 1901. If we add the French proportion of $28\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. to the British proportion of 54 p.c., we get



about $82\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. for the two principal nationalities in Canada, leaving $17\frac{1}{2}$ p.c. for all other races. It is noticeable that the number of Jews—so described—has grown from 16,131 in 1901 to 75,681 in 1911.
